COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this modern epoch, Christian leadership is a subject terribly trivialized. Perhaps no other topic is so reduced to microwavable principles than that of leadership. This course, to the contrary, claims that to be a better leader, one must be a better Christian. Leadership that is distinctively Christian is examined in the course through biblical, theological, historical, and practical analysis so that God's people might more thoroughly follow the Way and show the Way to others.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

The aim of this course is for students to achieve the following by the end of the course:

- 1. Identify the key shortcomings of faulty leadership and its works.
- 2. Evaluate significant works on leadership from a biblical perspective.
- 3. Assess the primary theological foundations for any faithful Christian leader.
- 4. Describe the proper exercise of biblical theology to the topic of Christian leadership.
- 5. Develop his/her own philosophy of leadership.

REQUIREMENTS

READING -- (20% of course grade)

These texts are **required reading** to be completed by assigned dates during course:

- 1. Albert Mohler, The Conviction to Lead
- 2. John Stott, Basic Christian Leadership
- 3. Timothy S. Laniak, Shepherds after My own Heart
- 4. Gregory the Great, The Book of Pastoral Rule (Popular Patristics Series)
- 5. Stephen Mansfield, Never Give In

WRITING – (60% of course grade) The four writing assignments for this course are listed below and must be double-spaced, 12pt New Times Roman font, with a title page, and bibliography:

a) **REFLECTION PAPER** – (10% of course grade) Students will write a 1,500 word paper reflecting on their own personal experience with leading others. Include a brief personal assessment of your strengths and weaknesses. Additionally, choose someone who has observed you in leading others and ask them provide you with a brief assessment of your strengths, as well as suggestions for improving as a leader. Describe what you've learned about your own leadership and the biggest challenges you face. **Due - September 25, 2017**

b) **PHILOSOPHY OF LEADERSHIP PAPER** – (30% of course grade) Students will write a 5,000 word paper on their personal philosophy of leadership. Students must engage Scripture and a minimum of 10 sources to develop this paper. **Due - December 18, 2017**

c) **BOOK REVIEWS** – (20% of course grade) Students will write a 700 word review of each book in the required reading. The first half of this paper should summarize the work while the last half should be a critical evaluation, demonstrating the biblical fidelity of the work along with its strengths and weaknesses.

ATTENDANCE AND DISCUSSION – (20% of course grade) Students are expected to come to each class having read the assigned readings and prepared to take part in discussion. Textbooks and Bible should be brought to class. The course will include at least 24 hours of classroom instruction.
